*Feature articles should be framed in one of the following ways: single case-studies, preferably research aimed at furthering theoretical analysis; contributions to a theoretical appraisal or description of settler colonialism (how it works, where it appears, etc.); applications of critical theory, or a particular thematic approach, to one or more settler colonial place or idea; comparative or transnational analyses involving two or more settler sites; research focusing on evolving relationships between settlers and indigenous peoples; analyses of legal and political ramifications of settler colonial phenomena.*
